Jane practices law in several areas, including Environmental Justice, Climate Change Adaptation Plans, Federal Indian Law, National Environmental Policy Act, Clean Water Act, Superfund, and NHPA. She has written and published numerous law review articles on Environmental and Federal Indian Law topics.

Ms. Kloeckner was a practicing civil engineer in St. Louis before moving to Lee's Summit. She received a BS degree in civil engineering from Missouri Science & Technology, her JD from St. Louis University, and masters of law (LLM) from UMKC. She is a member of the Missouri Bar, Federal Bar, and St. Anne's Episcopal Church. Jane resides in Lee's Summit with her husband and their two children.
